Judith Schoolfield moved from Lynchburg, Va. to Dublin, Wayne County,  
Indiana in 1830, bringing with her the last five named above, having buried  
the oldest four at Lynchburg, Va.

Mary B. taught the first school in Dublin in 1830, and was married to  
Dr. John M. Bell Feb. 7, 1834 and born to them were the following children;

After the death of Dr. John Beaty, which occurred Jan. 29, 1847, Clareha Schoolfield Beaty, wife of Dr. John Beaty, married Dr. Hilliard W. Hazzard. I do not know the date of their marriage but about 1849. There were born to them the following children:

Dr. John Beaty's first marriage was to Martha Paxton, March 2, 1830. One child was born to them

Nancy Jane born April 9, 1831.

The time of her marriage or death is not known. She was married to Colier Sawyer, at Corinth, Miss. where she passed away, leaving four (4) or 5 children, but I have lost all trace of them. Afterward Colier Sawyer married Nancy F. Beaty, and she died in Corinth, Miss., leaving several children. I know nothing of them or the father, lost all trace of them.

Genealogy of Dr. John Beaty and ancestors, so far as I can obtain them. The following is a copy of an old manuscript found among Dr. John Beaty's papers, after his death by me. I do not know who wrote it, it reads as follows:

Arthur Beaty, son of John and Sarah Beaty, of the Parish of Donaghery, near Stewartstown, and County of Tyrone, Ireland was born Oct. 7, 1740, and the age of fourteen I went as apprentice to James Meek, Wheelmaker, in the County of Derry, and served him four years.

Two years after I started off from my father's house, on the third day of July 1760, and came to Philadelphia, in the Brig Rosearven, Thos. Marshall Commander, on the 27th of Sept.

On August 25, 1761, following I married Elinor Clark, daughter of Jeremiah and Elinor Clark, of the Parish of Qumleague, and County of Cork, ~~in~~ nineteen miles from Cork.

We had born to us as follows:

Sarah Born Oct. 9, 1762 at 7 o'clock in the evening and baptized by Mr. Ervin, in Philadelphia.

We left that place and came to Chester County, Penn. on Dec. 25th and lived there five years.

Our second born, Isabel, was born Feb. 20th at 5 o'clock in the morning, 1764 and was baptized by Mr. John Blair.

Our third born, John, was born Jan. 4th at 3:30 in the morning 1766, and was baptized by John Blair. †

I left Chester County, called Faggamanour April 1768, and came to the province of Md., County of Frederick, to West Ministertown.

Our fourth child, James was born May 7th at 12 o'clock morning, 1768 and was baptized by Mr. Slemons at Pinny Creek meeting house.

On June 9, 1768 I got hurt by a tree, and my son John got burned and died Oct. 7, 1769, age three years and ten months.

Our fifth child Mary was born Jan. 24th at 3 o'clock in the evening, 1770, and as baptized by Mr. Allison at Pipe Creek furnace.

Mary died September 15, 1770.

Our sixth child, Samuel, was born Oct. 16th at 4 o'clock in the evening 1771, and was baptized by Mr. Joseph Rean, at West Minstertown.

Our seventh child, John was born Aug. 31st, at 4 o'clock in the evening, 1773.

We came away from Westminster and province of Pa. (?) having purchased of Chas. Pantine eight acres of land at a place called White Run, April 1775. We moved from that place to Rock Creek, in May; John as baptized by Mr. Slemons at Marsh Creek meeting house.

Our eighth child, <sup>David</sup> Aaron was born Nov. 23<sup>rd</sup>, 1775, at 10 o'clock in the morning and baptized December ~~25~~ 27, by Mr. Slemons at my house.

August 22, 1776, I went to the army at Amboy, and stayed six weeks; came home and had a sore spell of sickness.

December 7, 1777, my wife was delivered of a daughter, still born; buried next day at Marsh Creek Church.

June 21, 1778 we set off from Rock Creek with our wagon and three horses and six children. On July 10, 1778, we arrived at John Patterson's on the Middle River in Aggatha County, Va. We rented a farm of him for one year, located on Middle River, and stayed until the following April 1779. The 2nd of that month we moved from there near Providence meeting house, to a place rented of John Wardlow in Rockbridge Co., Va. We stayed there until the following winter and then moved about a mile farther from said meeting house, where we took a plantation on the shares, owned by John Steward, on which we lived until the spring of 1782.

But in the year of 1781, June 5, I was called to the camp and we marched away about June 24, 1781, down to Richmond. On June 26, we were in a small battle with the British in which our loss was small. The enemy lost about sixty. I was taken sick the day following and continued so until discharged, my time being nearly up. I came home, recovered my health, and Feb. 22, 1782, bought a plantation the estate of Wm. Eomiston (deceased), at a cost of two hundred and one pounds, to be paid in three installments. We moved to it in April, it being about two miles from said meeting house and in said county.

On Oct. 10, following our second daughter, Isabel, was married to David Campbell of said county; married by Wm. Brown.

April 24, 1787 I sold my plantation to Hugh Cummings for one Hundred and fifty pounds and moved away to a place I rented from Wm. Gibson in said county near Timber Ridge House, having an exceedingly dry spring; stayed one year and then rented a place of the Widow Little on Mill Creek, to which we moved in April 1788.

On Dec. 8 our daughter, Sarah was married to Joseph Little, son of Joseph Little of ~~Timor~~ Timber Ridge, by Mr. Graham.

We moved to Lexington April 23, 1789, rented a house for ~~fort~~ forty shillings for three months. We stayed in the house two months during which time I built a house on a lot of land I had bought two or three years before.

In the year 1793, our son Samuel died at Shepherdstown, in the month of March the 9th day at 4 o'clock in the morning, age twenty two years and six months(?).

April 23, 1797 we left Lexington and moved to Timber Ridge meeting house, to a place I rented of Samuel Hustong for ten dollars a year.

In 1798 our son John, was married to Elizabeth Morris, by Mr. Vanzant.

Feb. 28, 1799 our youngest son, Aaron was married to Isabel Reid, daughter of Joseph /Reid, by Mr. Brown.

April 1799, I returned to Lexington to our former living place, and our son Aaron, moved to us the next fall, staying with us until Aug. 21, 1800, when he moved to Fairfield.

In 1803, Jan. 6 at 2 o'clock my wife died, and was buried the Friday following, at Lexington meeting house. In 1803 Aaron's wife died at 10 o'clock at night, and was buried the following Tuesday at Reid house.

In Oct. 1803, I set off for Tenn. and stayed about four weeks, and returned to Rockbridge, staying until July 10, 1809. Then I went back to Tenn. arrived at Marysville the 1st of Aug. and stayed until Sept 10; then went back to Va., arriving at James Beaty's in two weeks. The following Oct. I set off with James Beaty and family to Tenn. and got to Blunt Co. on the 29th of Sept., being out four weeks.

May 1806, Aaron Beaty came to Tenn. with his family and the first of Sept. commenced school teaching, engaged for three months. Then Aaron started Sept 4, for Va. and returned shortly.

Oct. 12, 1809, I started for Va. and May 8, following I received a letter from John Beaty's widow, stating that he had died Oct. 9, 1809, aged thirty-six years. I started back to Tenn. Oct 29, 1809, and in Sept. I came to James Beaty's in health. On Thurs. Dec. 2, 1809, Jas. Beaty started to Va.

Rev. Robt. Burns Beaty, son of Dr. John and Clarena Schoolfield Beaty was born April 4, 1836 at Dublin Wayne County, Indiana where he grew to manhood. He was educated in the public schools. At eleven years of age his father departed this life. When thirteen of age he was bound to Wm. Barrett of Dublin for three years to learn Harness trade. At the end of said apprenticeship he went to Knightstown, Henry Co, Indiana to work at his trad<sup>e</sup> with Lowrey Brothers.

During that year he attended a revival, 1852, conducted in the M. E. church by Rev. Colwell Robins of the North Indiana Conference, and under deep conviction of sin he sought and found peace in believing in the Son of God, and experience which he enjoyed and prized above rubies. Shortly after he entered the ministry where he remained faithfully for forty-four

On the 29th day of July 1924, he grew tired from his long journey, which stretched out a little more than ninety one years, and lay himself down to rest, closed his eyes to the things of this life, and fell asleep in Jesus.

On Oct. 31, <sup>1858</sup>~~1958~~, Rev. Robert B. Beaty was ~~united~~ united in marriage to Lydia A. Lippy, at Dublin, Wayne Co. Indiana. To this family were born three children; Sarah E., Clara E., and John E.

Sarah E. Beaty was born July 22, 1859 and died Oct. 4, 1907.

Clara T. Beaty was born Aug. 7, 1861 and died Jan. 17, 1886.

John E. Beaty was born April 13, 1864 - 19 months old when mother died

Lydia A. Lippy was born Dec. 1, 1838, and died Nov. 18, 1865, born at York Sulpher Springs, Pa.

On Aug. 6, ~~1865~~ (?1866?) at Greentown, Indian, Robert B. Beaty was united in marriage to Zenitia W. Woods. To this union were born seven children
